Pavandeep Josan: Hi everyone I'm Pavandeep Josan I'm the Vice President of Equity and Inclusion at the Graduate and Professional Student Senate, GPSS and I just want to make a quick statement from the GPSS Executive Committee. So we are aware that there has been some legislation introduced to this Senate about the ASUW Board of Directors and we are aware that last week in the Senate meeting there was some mention that GPSS is supportive of that. I want to make a statement that the GPSS Executive Committee voted on last week and approved me to make here today, which is categorically to set the record straight. The GPSS Executive Committee stands fully behind the ASUW Board of Directors, and we stand against any attempt to undermine them or the work that they do. So I just want to make that plain and clear that GPSS, at least from our executive point of view, is not in support of this. That's all I have to say to you all today. Allison McClaughry and Lane Ryan: My name is Allison. I'm one of the co-directors of the American Indian Student Commission. Sorry, and I'm Lane. Today we're going to be proposing a bill that requires some cultural context regarding the practice of smudging and we made an infographic. OK. So this infographic kind of goes over what smudging is. If you could all take a bit to look at it and over kind of get that in your head so when we propose the bill, all questions and comments can come in with the same cultural context. Yeah, essentially smudging is a form of prayer that every tribal nation does. It varies based on family and what tribe you come from. Teachings are all different family to family and but yeah, essentially, it's just burning of these sacred medicines. It's tobacco, sweet grass, cedar and sage and it's in a noncombustible container. So normally like an abalone shell or kind of like a metal tin. And yeah, depending on what you're going through, it's just it's to support your mental, emotional, spiritual self in times of hardships or just when you want to cleanse. And yeah, it's just a form of prayer, how we connect to our cultural traditions. And is very vital to our way of life. Yeah. And later when we present, if you're like, oh, I've never heard of this, I don't know about your culture, just please feel free to ask questions. There's no, no dumb questions. We want to make sure that we're all able to equally vote and understand the context behind this bill. Thank you.

Kaitlyn O'Connor: Hi guys I'm Kaitlyn I'm from the Office of Government Relations here with some legislative session updates. End of session is March 12th, so this is really like home stretch. The legislation that is being heard in the House and the Senate right now that is backed by student efforts, it's very important that we keep momentum and we get those passed because now is really make or break time. So just make sure that you're being kept up on leg.wa.gov as well as the ASUW OGR Instagram. NEW BUSINESS

Erick Jacobsen: We will now move on to summary of new business today. We have 3 new bills today. One of them is an Organic Act, so that one goes directly into old business. We do have two bills that will be going into committee. Our first is R-32-4. Resolution 32-4 is a resolution in support of a pro student and pro indigenous smudging policy at the University of Washington. I don't see a bill summary here. Would the sponsors like to quickly summarize their bill?

Lane Ryan reads bill summary

Erick Jacobsen: Thank you. All right, we our next item of new business is OA-32-3. Summary of that is this organic act removes and adds members to the ASUW restructuring committee from OA-32-2 to address new senator interest, resignations and disinterest in being a member. I'm sorry, R dash 32-4 is in the On Campus Affairs Committee. I was referred there by the Steering Committee. OA-32-3 goes immediately into old business as per our bylaws. And then our next item of business is LD-32-4. The summary is this legislative directive authorizes ASUW lobbying on HB2411, which authorizes paid leave for public employees such as those employed by the University of Washington in the case of absences due to hate crimes or immigration enforcement action in line with JR-31-3 and that bill is going into Off Campus Affairs. General Affairs you still have SB-32-3 Senate Bill on

Institutional Reform and ASUW Restructuring Committee you still have a discussion on SB-32-2 constitutional amendments. And within those two committees, it'll be only committee members speaking so that we can give all the committee members the time to share their opinions without any outside influence. So the sponsor, if you have questions for him, we'll get those questions and get answers back, but it'll be only committee members in the committee.

Justin Amaral: point of information if a committee member chooses to yield their time for a question, will then a member be able to ask a question?

Erick Jacobsen: Joseph, is that parliamentarily allowed or is it up to the chair?

Joseph Riggio: Well, since points of information are ultimately in the chair's discretion, it would even if they do yield their time and another member were to make a point of information, the chair would still have the discretion to allow that or not.

Erick Jacobsen: OK. So that's probably going to be a no. So we just want to, we want to encourage discussion between senators and then get any questions answered in like a more like organized way potentially at the end or at or at the middle or in a certain point as the committee sees that we want to empower Senator discussion. So with that we will now be entering committees.

Joseph Riggio: Would the prime sponsor like to read the bill in full please?

Joseph Riggio: Would the prime sponsor like to give any more context?

Erick Jacobsen: Yeah. So I think it's pretty clear in the bill, but this is something that we passed in our joint resolution before that we want this to happen. And we've been working on it in consultation with GAVEL, in consultation with Kate Lawson, our Director of University Affairs. But Osman Salahuddin introduced this bill. I noticed it and it's in line with our priorities so I talked to Brandon. Brandon indicated that he would be in favor of lobbying for this if a legislative directive passed and that he supported the passing of the legislative directive. So then I brought it to steering and I wrote it and basically this is just an attempt to enact one of our past resolutions with the support of OGR.

Joseph Riggio: Opening up the floor for questions now.

Erick Jacobsen: OK, we are moving on now to our second item of old business, which is R-32-4 if the sponsors would like to come up. And Blair, if you'd like to come up as well to talk about how it went in committee. To start, if the sponsors would just like to read out the bill in full.

Allison McClaughry reads R-32-4 That clauses

Erick Jacobsen: Is there any context you would like to provide senators other than what's in the bill? All right, Abigail, no wrong committee. Blair, would you like to come up and explain what discussions were like in On Campus Affairs?

Blair Yeh: Ok so mainly we had grammatical edits. there wasn't really. Or yeah, I'll just go through it. So on line 36 or first there was a repeat from 10 to 13 like over here on lines 10 to 13 where it was just repeating the previous whereas clause from lines 4-8 so we deleted that one and the next one was we just added a comma on line 36 after "whereas that the free exercise and establishment clauses of the United States Constitution reads" then comma and we go into the quote. And then the next one was, this was made also with like the prime and co-sponsors. We changed the word unknown to unfamiliar so that it's "whereas the standards placed by the UW on those who wish to smudge include requiring 2 weeks of advanced notice and unfamiliar." And instead of outside we we decided to specify that instead of outside individual, we specified saying UW fire alarm faculty member to be present at the ceremony signs alerting the public and outside approval. And also another grammatical error on line 73 in the back clauses. We just added an S at the end of students that the associated students of the University of Washington affirms and we also added another comma after legislature on line 75. So this clause is now that the Associated Students of the University of Washington affirms and supports the work of others across the state in the legislature comma and across higher education. To have a pro indigenous policy on the subject. And then we all liked the bill.

Erick Jacobsen: Thank you, Blair.

Husna Chepkemboi: I have some questions about this bill specifically on why did was it not like accepted at first? Because I need a little bit more context on why it's not accepted and I also need to know more information on how it'll be implemented. Like on the list of medicinal herbs, those tobacco and the other medicinal herbs, I'm OK with it. But the tobacco part, I feel like there should be more places where like you can burn the tobacco and places where you can't because it has affect some students religion and cultural practices.

Erick Jacobsen: With that, we are now in a period of debate and the debate is on whether or not to approve it right now. So we cannot actually directly ask the sponsors questions because of the motion that was made. But if the motion maker withdraws his motion, then we can go back to the initial part. Or if the objector withdraws her objection, then we go into. The vote again. Are there any questions or comments related to this topic?

Aiden Reeder: I'm in favor but I think it is still valid to want to ask questions. So I'm just going to move to the previous question.

Aiden Reeder moves the previous question

Erick Jacobsen: All right, now we will go into a vote via our office forum on whether or not to approve this resolution right now. If this vote fails, there can be another vote in the future if the intent is to just have more discussion.

Isaac Pasco: Point of parliamentary inquiry If a bill fails to get a simple majority of votes in favor does it fail like if more than half of the people either vote no or abstain, but not fully half vote no?

Erick Jacobsen: Abstentions are not counted at all. So it would just be abstentions only matter for quorum. So let's say 50 people abstain and 20 people are in favor, 19 people are against. That still passes. Is that the question?

Isaac Pasco: yes.

Julia Tanner: Point of parliamentary inquiry, if it perchance does pass, but there's a high percent of people who voted no with the intention of discussing further, can there be a call to recount or to revote?

Erick Jacobsen: There can be another motion to reconsider and that would allow the bill to still be passed out. So the vote failing doesn't necessarily mean that the bill is dead forever. It just means that we didn't want to approve it right now, and we can reconsider it if we also want to.

Julia Tanner: OK, if it does pass, but there's a high amount of people saying they oppose the bill, which like kind of blurs how actually people feel about the bill itself, can there be a movement to reconsider?

Erick Jacobsen: I don't believe it can be. We can reconsider after it passes, but Brendan is thinking very thoughtfully and opening up his phone to check. So we'll see about that. Do you have another question?

Justin Amaral: Ok so since the motion to vote has passed, there is no way to get out of that? There's no way to suspend it or push it?

Erick Jacobsen: When we're in the middle of the vote, we have to complete the vote. This is why I do highly recommend that we hold off on motions until, we're sure.

Isaac Pasco: Could a person move to suspend the rules and suspend the vote?

Joseph Riggio: no.

Brendan Chang: The answer is yes, you can motion to reconsider, but only someone who voted on the majority side can motion for reconsideration.

Erick Jacobsen: OK, so to clarify, that means if the motion passes, but it looks like a bunch of people don't support this, and you want to make sure that that's not the case and you voted in favor, you can move to reconsider and have a new vote.

R-32-4 approved 58-17-24

Erick Jacobsen: So it's passed and we're done unless someone makes another motion.

Joseph Riggio: I can explain the without vote. I mean the right now they would just be sitting in the committee. They wouldn't count towards voting quorum, they are just there. That is, if we want to completely strike Skylar from it, just to be safe, that is totally something we can do too. But right now it wouldn't impact the vote of any final action that the committee does.

Isabelle Green: So I had a question about the final That clause that stipulates that if a senator is named as a member of this committee, holds an elected position in the Senate, and resigns or is deactivated, then their successor automatically replaces their membership claim to the ASUW restructuring committee. Why does this appear to be set up as what is essentially a hereditary position and like what's the logic behind this instead of having people re nominate themselves for the committee?

Joseph Riggio: Taking that as a point of information, so the so the reason why is because the reason a large part of the reason why this bill exists is because we had some resignations and liaisons and the intention of OA 32-2 was that primarily liaisons and GAVEL members would sit on this committee. And so because that was the original intention, this or that clause just ensures that we don't have to create yet another bill to do the restructuring. This essentially is a a blanket clause kind of encompassing in the event that we have a deactivation or resignation in a position, if we do another election and that position is filled they automatically fill the seat so that way it doesn't, vacancies wouldn't affect quorum anyway, but the intended number of votes that that committee was supposed to had was supposed to be the number that we approve here. So to maintain that number this clause would prevent that number from fluctuating throughout the year.

Erick Jacobsen: Are there any other questions, comments or motions on this bill?

Justin Amaral: I move to amend the final that clause to properly reflect its purpose. So right now it seems to just it just says automatically replaced their membership claim to the ASUW restructuring committee, but doesn't specify who or what requirements the replacement would need to have in order to be a replacement. As you said the the committee was originally. It's supposed to be held by members that hold seats in. I forgot, but you said something and I think that should be properly reflected into that clause. So they can't just put anybody that they want in that seat.

Erick Jacobsen: So what do you want to, like, put in the bill? Like, how do you want to phrase it? You can also have time to think about it.

Dylan Bianchi: I'm really not sure what further changes need to be made and I'd like to go home.

Justin Amaral: frankly I don't think going home is a reason to vote yes or no on a bill. I think we always have the option of delaying the bill and we could just push it to the next meeting while I get my proposed changes in.
