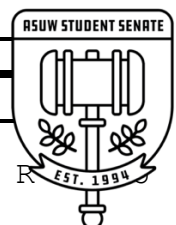

SENATE RESOLUTION R-32-05



A Resolution to Direct ASUW and GPSS
Executives to Create the Student Health Fee
Memorandum of Understanding

Under Consideration - 2025-2026 Academic Year

BILL SUMMARY: Since Autumn of 2024, the ASUW held conversations with UW Husky Health, LiveWell, and the Counseling Center to discuss funding pathways to sustain, improve, and increase health services for students. Simultaneously, R-31-4, A Resolution to Support Increased Funding and Staffing for the UW Counseling Center, passed unanimously by the ASUW Board and Senate. The Student Health Fee Planning Committee was created to assess student interest in a student-governed fee like UPASS, Services and Activities Fee (SAF), and Student Technology Fee (STF). This fee is designed to separate Health Units under SAF, and allow for a sustainable funding pathway for these units. Health Units proposed to the planning committee a \$125 per quarter per student fee. This bill references a survey conducted by ASUW, GPSS, and the Health Units that opened in November and Closed in February. 6045 students (2401 graduate, 37 non-matriculated, and 3607 undergraduate students) completed the survey. Out of 6045 responses to Question 1 about establishing the Student Health Fee committee in the 2027-2028 Academic School Year, 39.86% of students responded "Yes," 23.61% responded "Maybe," and 36.54% responded "No." However, the survey data demonstrates that the majority (61.75%) of undergraduate students prefer a fee lower than \$125 per quarter per student, and 66% of undergraduate students support the fee

as an option to improve Health Unit services. This bill, pursuant to UW Policy SGP 205 Voluntary Fees of Students, directs ASUW and GPSS to negotiate the fee logistics, amount, and conditions attached to its passing with the Student Life Division.

SECTION I: Student Health Fee Conversation Context

WHEREAS federal policy and lack of Washington State support or intervention currently places the burden of absorbing costs on health providers and services; and

WHEREAS UW Husky Health, LiveWell, and the Counseling Center predict rising costs, and will be forced to raise per-visit fees on all students in the coming years if their funding model does not change within the next five years, which will negatively impact all students who need to use their services [9][12]; and

WHEREAS the ASUW Senate has passed several bills related to clinical health, health supplies, student mental health, and wellbeing, including R-31-4 to support funding the Counseling Center [1], R-31-12 for UW to adopt the Okanagan Charter [2], R-31-32 to support an increase in Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner access [3], R-30-5 to support international student difficulties navigating health insurance [4]]; and

WHEREAS during 2025-2026, The ASUW Board of Directors (BOD) granted funding to several health-related and social welfare projects including BOARD BILL 3.10 to donate \$10,000 to the UW Food Pantry [5], BOARD BILL 3.15 to collaborate with Husky Health for the Autumn "Get Yourself Tested" campaign [6], BOARD BILL 3.21 to fund pregnancy tests for UW Students [7], and BOARD BILL 3.28 to fund the purchase of Naloxone by the Husky Health Center [8]; and

WHEREAS in 2024-2025, former ASUW President Naomi Snow began assessing the potential for a Student Health fee as a reliable funding model for UW Husky Health, Livewell, and the Counseling Center; and

WHEREAS these conversations have since expanded to include students from Husky Health Advisory Board, Livewell Peer Health Educators, and the Counseling Center Advisory Board; and

WHEREAS an unofficial committee was formed in Spring of 2025 consisting of executives from GPSS, ASUW, and the Health Units to further investigate how the health fee would impact Services and Activities Fee (SAF) Units since separating the Health Units from SAF would generate a pool of approximately 9.3 million dollars in unallocated funds; and

WHEREAS the remaining SAF units propose the following program improvements if they receive an additional 15% or 35% increase due to the Health Fee, which include:

- 1) Student Legal Services (SLS), at a 15% increase, would offer more free legal representation to all UW Seattle students, and at 35%, would hire additional attorneys in diverse legal areas not already covered.
- 2) UW Husky Food Pantry, at a 15% increase, would hire additional student employees, and at 35%, would hire a full-time pantry manager to meet rise in demand given SNAP program volatility.
- 3) The Q Center, at a 15% increase, enable more pilot annual rotating programs like menstrual underwear distribution, and at 35%, would Shift CSF-funded resource programs fully under Q Center thereby freeing up campus sustainability funds for other projects.
- 4) Student Veteran Life Office, at a 15% increase, would hire 51% Full Time Employee Health & Wellness Program Coordinator.
- 5) Student Publications, at a 15% increase, would increase stipends/pay rates for student contributors, and at 35%, would substantially increase stipends for student journalists and fund Student travel to cover state/campus events (Olympia, Big Ten, etc.).
- 6) The Graduate and Professional Student Senate (GPSS), at a 15% increase, would host a more robust graduate research symposium with dedicated networking and job connection time, relevant speaker, and more nutritious food, and at 35%, would increase the cap for their funding buckets (Travel Grants, Special Allocations, Departmental Allocations, Diversity funds) so that students would be able to apply for more funding for their conference travel and RSO and departmental programming, and create a Graduate Student Emergency Fund and Senatorial Scholarship and Endowment program.

73 7) UW Recreation, at a 15% increase, would address deferred
74 facility maintenance to "ensure safety and functionality,"
75 and at 35%, would expand student access by reducing costs
76 to programs such as class passes, the climbing center, and
77 other fee-based programs.

79 **WHEREAS** the SAF Committee identifies the following proposals for
80 action to address the Health Units' departure, which amounts to
81 \$69 per quarter per student, ordered by likelihood:

- 82 1) The remaining funds after the separation of Health Units
83 from SAF would be reallocated to the other 15 units, and
84 SAF would freeze the fee for the number of years required
85 to balance the surplus.
- 86 2) SAF would create a reserve fund with the remaining funds
87 for project proposals introduced during the fiscal year.
- 88 3) The remaining funds after the separation of Health Units
89 from SAF would be reallocated to the other 15 units, and
90 SAF might lower their fee partially, which could lower the
91 total SAF fee by up to \$35 for each student.

93 **SECTION II: THE SURVEY REPORT**

94 **WHEREAS** the establishment of a new student fee through ASUW and
95 GPSS must follow the procedures outlined in UW Policy SGP 205
96 "Voluntary Fees of Students" [9]; and

97 **WHEREAS** Section 3(A) of SGP 205 outlines requirements for
98 collection and administration, stating, that "Prior to asking
99 the administration to collect and administer a voluntary student
100 fee, ASUW and GPSS must assess student support for the fee in
101 one of two ways: a survey of the student body, or a written
102 petition" [9]; and

103 **WHEREAS** a simple majority from the survey with a 10% response
104 rate is required from undergraduates or graduates for a
105 Resolution to move forward, according to the UW Student Life
106 Division; and

107 **WHEREAS** the Student Health Fee Planning Committee chose to
108 conduct a survey with the UW Husky Health, LiveWell, and the

109 Counseling Center to assess student support for the Student
110 Health Fee [9]; and

111 **WHEREAS** the survey launched on November 12th, 2025, and closed on
112 February 4th, 2026 [12][13]; and

113 **WHEREAS** 11.19% of the undergraduate and 14.80% of the graduate
114 student population completed the survey (0.96% of respondents
115 were considered non-matriculated) (N = 52,304), which meets the
116 required SGP 205 10% representative sample requirements
117 [12][13]; and,

118 **WHEREAS** student status was verified via UW NetID permissions;
119 and

120 **WHEREAS**, to educate students on what ASUW and GPSS asked for in
121 the survey, the Health for Every Husky website was created under
122 the wellbeing.uw.edu domain, listing how each health unit would
123 benefit from a \$125 per quarter per student fee, what a student
124 governed health fee committee would look like, how the proposed
125 fee compares to other Big Ten universities, what might happen if
126 the fee is not approved, and how financial aid would cover the
127 Student Health Fee if implemented [9]; and

128 **WHEREAS** the following questions were asked in the survey
129 assessing support for the Student Health Fee [9][12][13]:

- 130 1) "Do you support the idea of establishing a Student Health
131 Fee that would support, sustain and improve student health
132 and well-being services at UW-Seattle's Counseling Center,
133 Husky Health Center and LiveWell, beginning in Academic
134 Year 2027-2028?"
- 135 2) "The health and well-being units, ASUW and GPSS are
136 exploring a Student Health Fee of about \$125 per student,
137 per quarter. This amount is based on research, service
138 requests by students and budget needs to maintain current
139 services and make the improvements previously listed in the
140 current financial climate. Do you support a \$125 per
141 quarter Student Health Fee?"
- 142 3) (Asked only students who answered "No" or "Maybe" to Q2):
143 "What concerns do you have about the \$125 per quarter
144 Student Health Fee? (Select all that apply.)
- 145 a. The cost is too high
146 b. I do not use these services frequently

147 c. I do not think I would use the service improvements
148 d. I will not be a UW student or able to use these
149 services come 2027-28
150 e. I do not have enough information to decide
151 f. I do not think UW students struggle with their health
152 and wellbeing
153 g. Other (please explain)"
154 4) (Asked only students who answered "No" or "Maybe" to Q2):
155 "Would you support a lower fee amount, understanding that
156 this may limit or reduce current services and potential
157 improvements?"

158 ; and

159 **WHEREAS** upon the survey's closing date, the Health Units
160 compiled a report detailing the main findings, both weighted
161 (based on population differences to balance the higher rates of
162 graduate response and account for other biases) and unweighted
163 (raw response data) [12];

164 **WHEREAS** the Student Life Division defines the answers to the
165 posed questions as follows:

- 166 1) "Yes" means absolute support for the question asked.
167 2) "Maybe" means open to consideration or no opinion.
168 3) "No" means absolute opposition for the question asked.

169 **WHEREAS** Question 1, regarding general support for the fee (n =
170 6045), and weighted based sample population differences,
171 received 39.86% "Yes" responses, 23.61% "Maybe" responses, and
172 36.54% "No" responses, indicating a higher "Yes" response rate
173 compared than the "No" rate for establishing a student-governed
174 health fee in 2027-2028 Academic School Year [12]; and

175 **WHEREAS** Question 1 unweighted responses received 38.18% "Yes"
176 responses, 38.88% "No" responses, and 22.94% "Maybe" responses;
177 and

178 **WHEREAS** Question 1 respondents included 1,749 undergraduates and
179 545 graduates, who responded "Yes," and 882 undergraduates and
180 1,454 graduates, who responded "No," confirming undergraduate
181 support for the health fee [12] [Appendix A]; and,

182 **WHEREAS** Question 2, regarding the \$125 proposal (n = 5753),
183 received 29.08% "Yes" responses, 22.35% "Maybe" responses, and
184 48.57% "No" responses, indicating a higher "No" response rate
185 compared to the "Yes" for the \$125 per quarter per student
186 health fee [12]; and

187 **WHEREAS** Question 2 respondents included 1,205 undergraduates and
188 461 graduates who responded "Yes," and 1,213 undergraduates and
189 1,565 graduates who responded "No," confirming that a lower than
190 \$125 fee is preferred by the majority of students [12] [Appendix
191 B]; and

192 **WHEREAS** students who selected "Maybe" or "No" on Question 3
193 selected (n = 3,936) "the cost is too high" the most, with "I do
194 not use these services frequently" as the second most, and "I do
195 not think I would use the service improvements" as the third
196 most [12] [Appendix C]; and

197 **WHEREAS** the lowest ranked item for Question 3 is "I do not think
198 UW students struggle with their health and wellbeing,"
199 suggesting that approximately 2.8% of respondents believe UW
200 students do not struggle with their health and wellbeing [12]
201 [Appendix C]; and

202 **WHEREAS** common additional themes from Question 3 answers,
203 including themes from the "Other reasons" fill in the blank
204 response, are "identifying alternative funding sources" rather
205 than a health fee, "questions about allocation and use of
206 existing funds," "comparisons between the proposed fee and
207 health insurance coverage," and "cost comparisons and impacts on
208 other student fees" [12] [Appendix C]; and,

209 **WHEREAS** Question 4 regarding support for a lower than \$125
210 proposal consisted of 3,936 respondents who responded "Maybe" or
211 "No" to Question 2, 28.81% of students responded "Yes," 34.98%
212 responded "Maybe," and 36.20% responded "No," indicating support
213 for Health Fee lower than \$125 per student per quarter [12]; and

214 **WHEREAS** Question 4 respondents included 828 undergraduates and
215 300 graduates who responded "Yes," and 448 undergraduates and
216 968 graduates who responded "No," confirming that a lower than
217 \$125 fee is preferred by the majority of students, especially
218 undergraduate students [12] [Appendix D]; and

219 **WHEREAS** combining the aggregate responses from Question 2 and
220 Question 4 (n = 5,594) results in 49.91% students who responded
221 "Yes," 25.83% responded "Maybe," and 24.26% who responded "No,"
222 confirming overall student support for a lower than \$125 health
223 fee [12] [Appendix D]; and

224 **WHEREAS** combining the undergraduate responses from Question 2
225 and Question 4 (n = 3,273) results in 61.75% students who
226 responded "Yes," 26.15% responded "Maybe," and 12.10% who
227 responded "No," confirming significant undergraduate student
228 support for a lower than \$125 health fee [12] [Appendix E];
229 and **WHEREAS** the conclusion from the Student Health Fee Executive
230 Summary reads:

231 "Survey results indicate strong support for establishing a
232 Student Health Fee. Weighted findings reveal that 63% of
233 respondents either support or are open to a fee, with
234 undergraduates expressing greater support than graduate
235 students. Additionally, 54% support or are open to the
236 proposed \$125 quarterly fee, though concerns about cost and
237 anticipated service use remain prevalent. Notably, many
238 students who are unsure or opposed to the fee would
239 consider a lower amount, raising overall openness to more
240 than 75%. Open-ended comments primarily addressed cost and
241 the intended use of funds."

242 [13]; and

243 **SECTION III: Next Steps**

244 **WHEREAS** Section 3(A) of SGP 205, which outlines procedures to
245 assess student support, does not require that student support
246 from undergraduates and graduates is necessary to move forward,
247 only that a representative sample of 10% from undergraduate and
248 graduate students is required to assess student support [9]; and

249 **WHEREAS** Section 3(D) of SGP 205 outlining implementation
250 procedures states that, "ASUW and GPSS shall develop, in
251 consultation with the technical and Student Life advisors, a
252 memorandum of understanding (MOU), which codifies the following:

- 253 1) The implementation date of the fee and sunset date (if
254 applicable)
- 255 2) The amount of the fee

256 3) The purpose for which fee proceeds are to be used
257 4) The population of students upon which the fee will be
258 imposed
259 5) The fee oversight plan
260 6) The means for terminating the agreement/fee
261 7) Any other terms identified by the signatories as necessary
262 to the smooth implementation and successful administration
263 of the fee and associated services."

264 [9]; and

265 **WHEREAS** this allows for the Student Health Fee to be imposed
266 only on undergraduate students to start, with mechanisms for
267 graduate and professional students to adopt the fee in the
268 future; and

269 **WHEREAS** imposing the fee only upon undergraduates would remove
270 potential funding from graduate students, require the Health
271 Units to create a new billing infrastructure for unsubsidized
272 graduate students, and could burden graduate students who need
273 services from the Health Unit; and

274 **WHEREAS** an undergraduate-only Student Health Fee would still
275 require GPSS approval and assistance to implement per SGP 205
276 Section 3(A) in addition to ASUW support and direction; and

277 **WHEREAS** it is necessary to task GPSS Executives to represent
278 graduate and professional student interests in the
279 implementation of the Student Health Fee to prevent unjustified
280 decisions which may negatively impact those students in
281 alignment with the survey results;

282 **THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY ASSOCIATED STUDENTS OF THE**
283 **UNIVERSITY OF WASHINGTON**

284 **THAT** ASUW directs their Board of Directors to engage in
285 conversations with the Graduate and Professional Student Senate
286 (GPSS), the Vice President and Vice Provost for Student Life,
287 Husky Health, LiveWell, and the Counseling Center on the Student
288 Health Fee implementation and governance structure pursuant to
289 SGP 205; and

290 **THAT** the Sponsoring Administrative Units for the Student Health
291 Fee Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) shall be the University of

292 Washington Seattle Husky Health Center, LiveWell, and Counseling
293 Center; and

294 **THAT** the ASUW Board of Directors shall represent the interests
295 of undergraduate students based on the survey report, which
296 reveals that, out of those who only chose the "Yes" or "No"
297 options on Question 1 (n=2632), 66% of chose "Yes",
298 conversations with undergraduate registered student
299 organizations, and undergraduate student employees of each
300 health unit in all discussions and decisions regarding the
301 Student Health Fee; and

302 **THAT** the Student Health Fee shall be lower than \$125 per quarter
303 per student as assessed in the Health Fee Survey at the
304 discretion of the ASUW Board and GPSS Executives;

305 **THAT** if negotiations move forward, the ASUW Board of Directors
306 and GPSS Executives shall incorporate conditions in the MOU that
307 guarantee services for all undergraduate students regardless of
308 race, ethnicity, nationality, disability status, sex, gender,
309 sexuality, age, citizenship, residential status, living
310 situation, financial situation, or military status, among other
311 protected characteristics; and

312 **THAT** outreach shall be conducted to the ASUW Joint Commissions
313 Committee and Office of Minority Affairs & Diversity Student
314 Advisory Board to ensure the MOU abides by the previous clause;
315 and

316 **THAT** discussions be held regarding the inclusion or exclusion of
317 graduate students in the Student Health Fee and, in the case of
318 the latter, a pathway be codified in the MOU to allow GPSS to
319 pass legislation that would include students represented by GPSS
320 in the imposition section of the MOU; and

321 **THAT** if negotiations do not move forward, then the ASUW and GPSS
322 will conduct an additional survey in 2026-2027 to measure
323 Graduate Student support for a health fee that must reach the
324 10% representative sample threshold established in SGP 205; and

325 **THAT** ASUW commits itself to continuing conversations with Health
326 Units, RSOs, GPSS, the UAW 4121 Academic Student Employee Union,
327 the Joint Commissions Committees, Student Veteran Life, Health
328 Unit Student Advisory Boards and student employees, and other

329 partners that address the student public health crisis,
330 anticipated reduction of health services, and rising cost to
331 utilizing many services until reliable funding and an improved
332 funding model is found; and

333 **THAT** the following parties or organizations be sent this

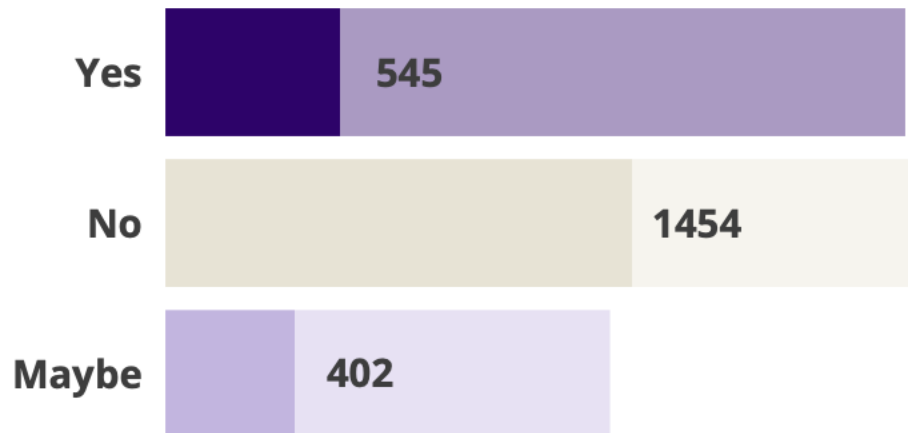

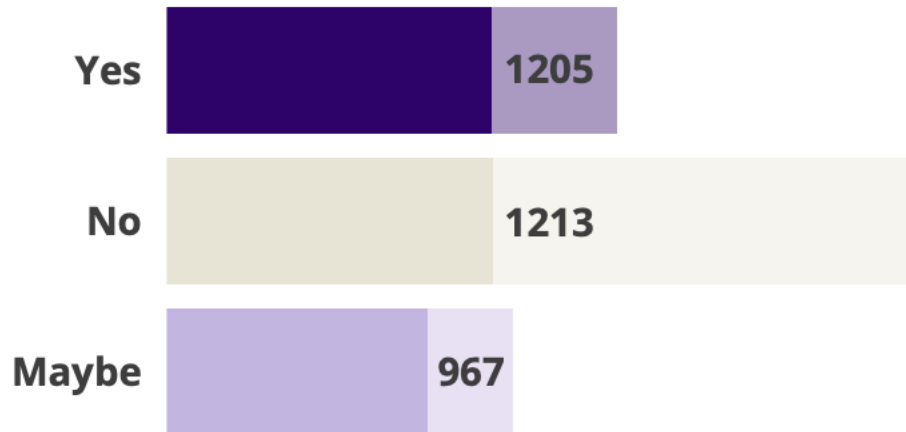

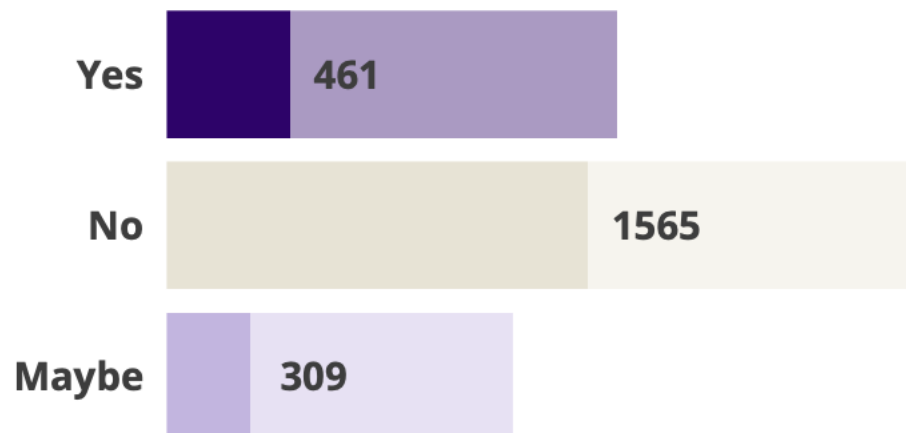

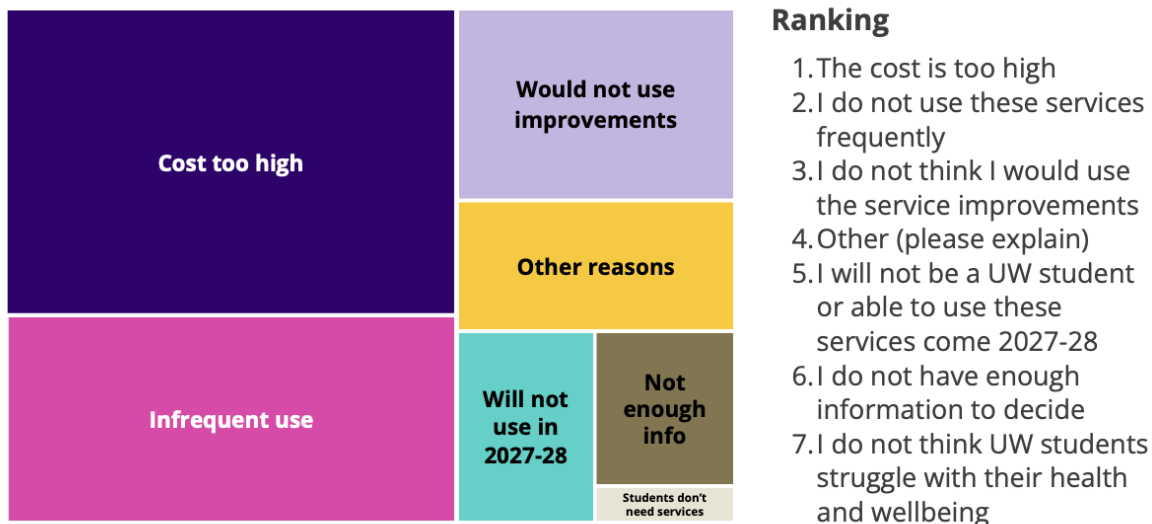

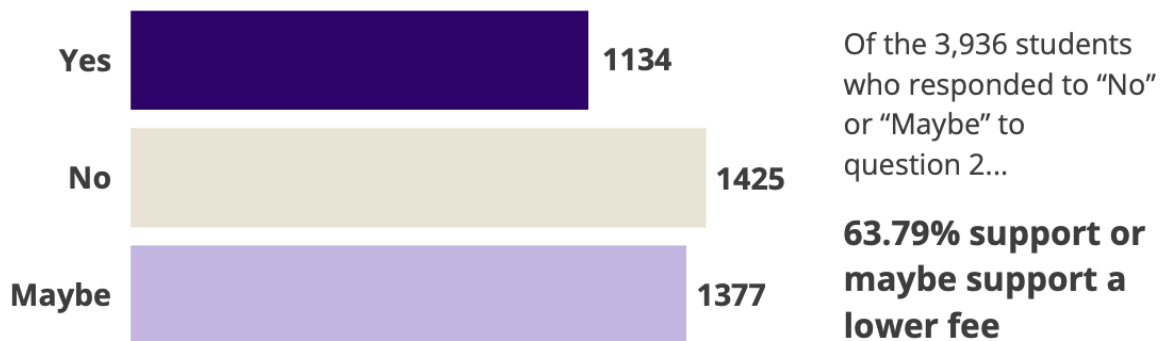

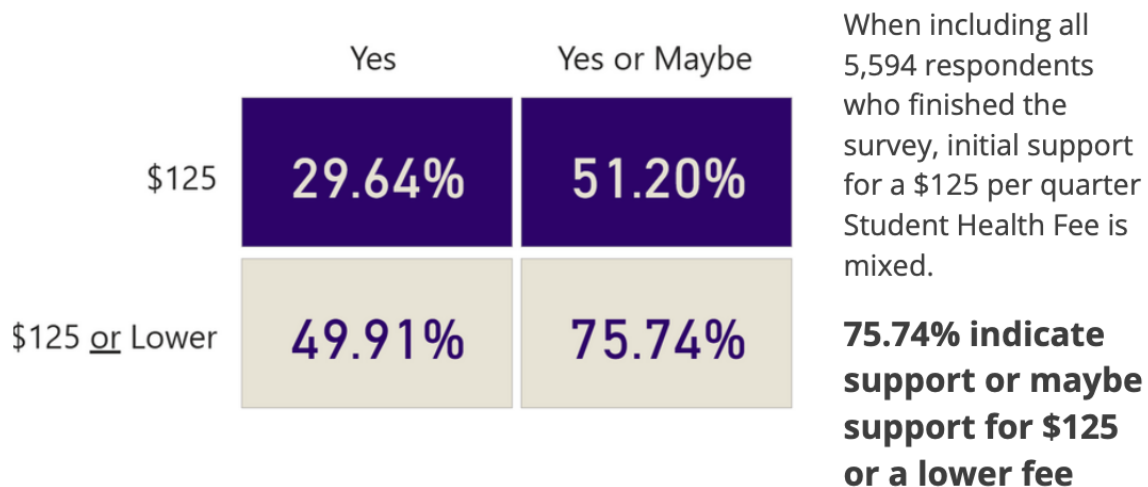
Support for a lower health fee

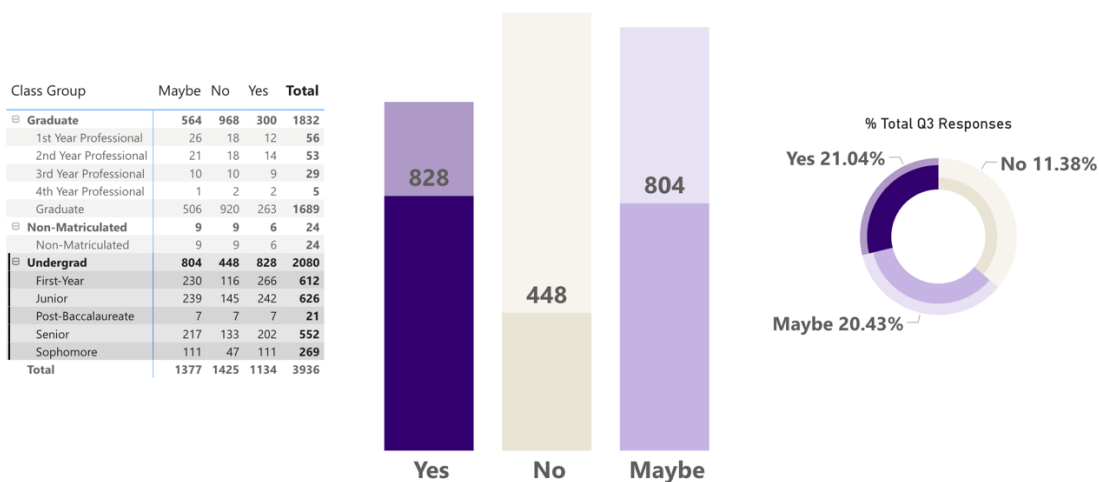


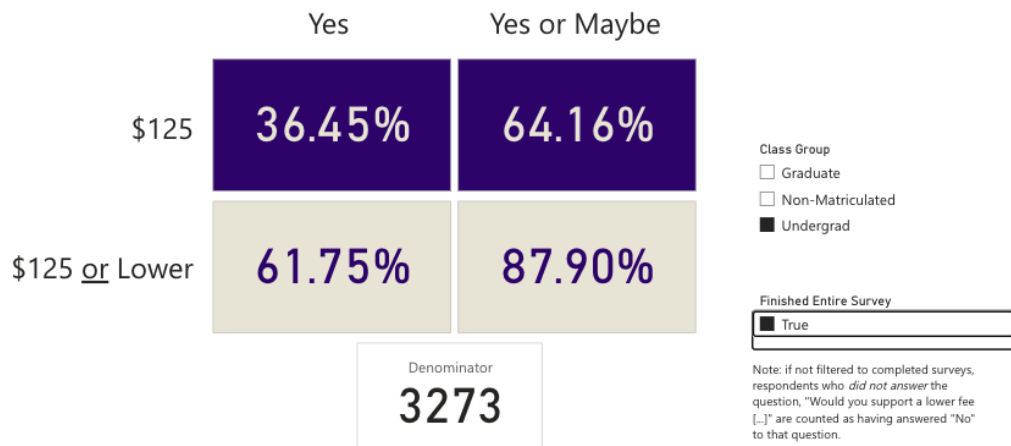

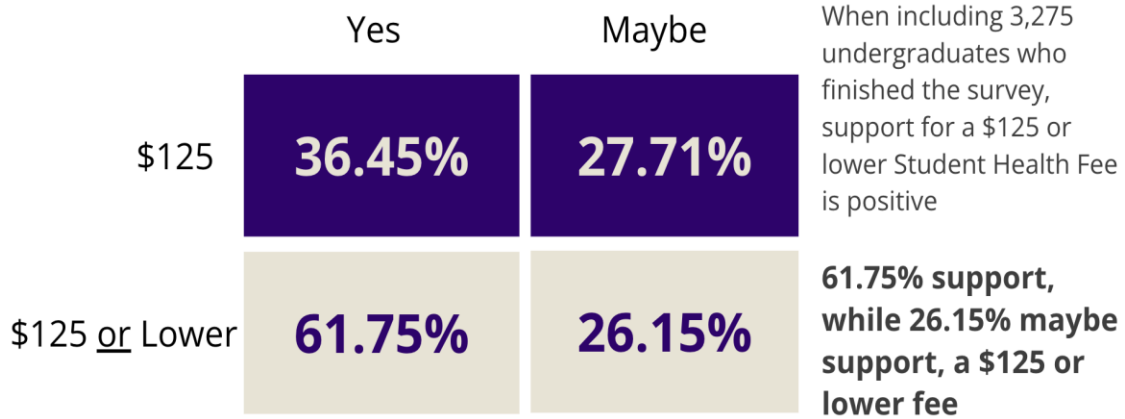

Undergraduate support for a \$125 or lower health fee

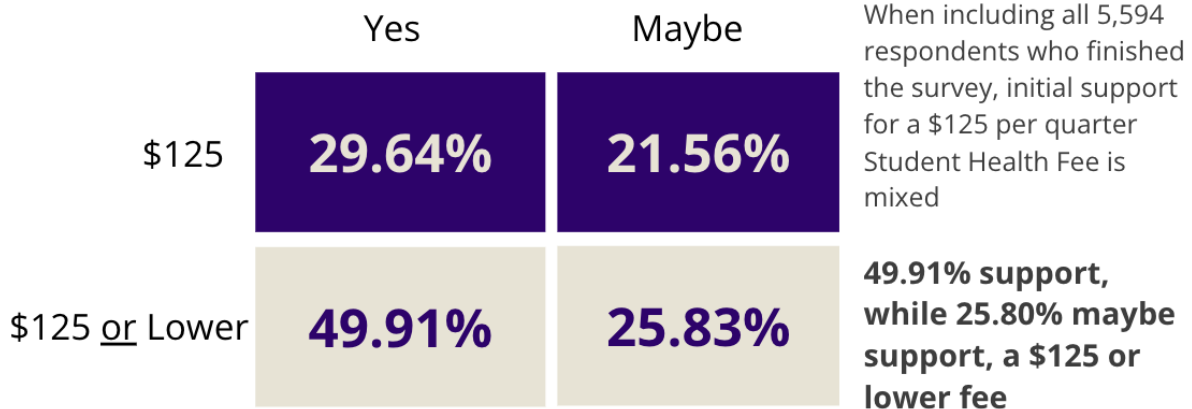
